Too much TV bad for education

TEENAGERS who watch too much television are less successful at school, according to a 20-year study of nearly 700 children. Those who watched a lot of TV had more problems at school and were less likely to go on to higher education, researchers found.

Dr Jeffrey Johnson of the Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons in New York led the research team, which studied young people's educational performance and TV habits at the ages of 13, 16, 22 and 33. The young people came from a range of social backgrounds and the team took their learning abilities at the start of the study into account.

The researchers found that the number of hours spent watching TV had a big effect on children's education. Twenty-two per cent of children who watched more than three hours of television a day - that included time spent playing Computer or video games - at the age of 14 did not go on to higher education. Only 7 per cent of those who watched less than an hour a day did not go to College or university.

For children who had learning problems to begin with, there was also a big difference: 45 per cent of those who watched a lot of TV did not go on to higher education, compared with 29 per cent of those who watched less than an hour a day.

The teenage years are very important for the development of thinking skills, and Dr Johnson says that children who spend too much of their free time watching television are not developing those skills. Watching TV is easy and does not require much concentration, unlike activities such as reading, and listening to the teacher during lessons.

- 20 Children who watch too much TV may "develop problems such as class-room boredom, 'hating school' and difficulty doing homework", Dr Johnson said. This, he suggests, may be partly because they have got used to the "highly stimulating material on the TV or video screen".
 - Dr Johnson said parents should limit their children's TV time. They should watch only "about one to two hours per day and they should be watching quality programming", he told journalists.
- Leonard Jason, a psychology researcher at De Paul University in Chicago who has studied children and the media for many years, took up the problem of "quality programming". He said that while there were good programmes on TV that were suitable for children, they were not the programmes kids watch. So to make sure their children are not harmed by TV, he says parents should see that they have television-free days or weeks.
- Television is a problem that is not going to go away, says Jason. In fact it will become a bigger problem as it moves into Computers and iPods. "TV will be in all parts of our kids' environment, at home, the supermarket, walking down the street with friends. It will be hard for them to separate reality from fantasy," he said.
- Statistics show that teenagers in the UK and the US already watch far more television than the researchers think is good for them. In American homes, a TV is on 7 hours and 40 minutes a day. The average 11 to 15-year-old in the UK spends seven and a half hours in front of the TV, video or Computer screen every day.
